Parents/Carers Update – September 2021

Included this month: Funded early years education places, disabled child benefits, the Twins Trust



Early years education places continue to be funded



Unfortunately, many parents have lost income or their jobs during the pandemic; but Government funded early years education places for <u>eligible 2-year-olds</u> and <u>all 3-and 4-year-olds</u> has continued to be available. Early years education provides socialisation and support with learning and development for children through play; as well as enabling parents to care for others, study or train, job hunt, volunteer, etc. Other funding such as the *Early Years Pupil Premium, Disability Access and SEN Inclusion funding* may be available to support the childcare provider with your child's

placement if appropriate. For help in applying and other queries, contact <u>Services for Young Children</u>.

For parents who are working or are on low incomes, you may be able to receive help with childcare costs through *Universal Credit (or Tax Credits)*, 30 Hours childcare or Tax-Free Childcare. Further details are available from *Childcare Choices*.

Wondering what benefits you can claim to help support your disabled child?

The <u>Turn2Us benefits calculator</u> helps you find out what benefits and other sources of financial help you might be entitled to. It helps to have the following to hand when using the calculator:



- Your earnings and savings, and any other investments or capital you might have.
- Any benefits you already claim for the adults and children in your home.
- Your annual council tax bill.
- Your rent or mortgage payments.
